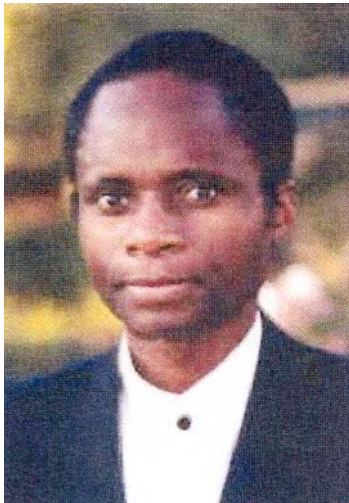

Mark Mathabane touched the hearts of millions with the publication of *Kaffir Boy*. Telling the true story of his coming of age under apartheid in South Africa, the book made the New York Times and Washington Post bestseller lists and was translated into several languages. Today, the book is used in classrooms across the U.S.

The sequel, *Kaffir Boy in America*, was also a national bestseller. *Love in Black and White*, which he coauthored with his wife Gail, a writer and communications manager, describes their personal odyssey as an interracial couple in America. Together they have appeared on talk shows, led workshops and delivered lectures on ways to heal the racial divide in America.

Mark's fourth book, *African Women: Three Generations*, describes the struggles, relationships and triumphs of three South African women who were heroines in *Kaffir Boy* – his grandmother, mother and sister Florah.

His latest nonfiction book, *Miriam's Song*, tells the true story of a young South African girl growing up amid the turmoil and violence that preceded the end of apartheid and Nelson Mandela's election. His first work of fiction, *Ubuntu*, is a novel set against the politically and racially tense backdrop of post-apartheid South Africa.
