## Student Responsibilities

- **Meet with college visitors** at Academy
- Prep for SAT/ACT
- Read your school e-mail
- **Meet with College Counselor**
- **Understand application requirements**
- Keep track of **deadlines**
- Write their own **college essays**
- Ask two teachers to write rec letters
- **Complete application(s) and the supplements**
- **Request Transcripts via Naviance** (one month in advance)
- **Send Official SAT/ACT scores from testing websites**
  - Actstudent.org and Collegeboard.com (click view and send scores)



## Student Role

- Be open to suggestions – your college list is fluid
- **Know when you need help from an adult...and don't wait until the last minute**
- Know when to help yourself
  - Example: "I know you already told us 5 times, but what is the registration deadline for the SAT?"
- **Be sensitive to your classmates**
  - confidentiality, pressure, language
- Know that you are not your GPA or the college you go to





## Counselor Responsibilities

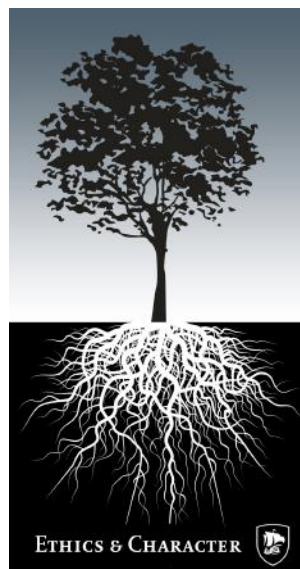
- Guide families through the many complexities of the process
  - **In the fall, meeting to review applications before student hits "submit"**
- Lead College Counseling Meetings for topics that apply to all
- Serve as external face of CA to colleges
  - **Host colleges who visit Academy**
  - Visit college campuses
  - **Attend 3-4 national conferences** per year
  - Stay abreast of NCAA rules/regulations
- Coordinate standardized testing
- Educate CA community (teachers, etc.) about current trends
- Narrate the **counselor (school) letter of recommendation**
- Send the following to colleges and universities:
  - Secondary School Report, Official Transcript, Counselor Recommendation
  - Teacher Recommendations, School Profile, 1<sup>st</sup> semester grades in January



## Counselor Role

- Provide support & advice
- Be an advocate for the student
- Help students learn important interpersonal skills
  - Introductions, interviews, and follow-up
- Place the college process in context within overall student development & school life
- Keep our core values at the center of the college admission process

## Parent Responsibilities

- Complete Parent Brag Sheet (Google Form – April junior year)
- Communicate with college counselor
- Attend Parent Nights, Coffees, & College Fairs
- Visit college campuses
- **Consider options with your student**
  - **Know the data**
- **Be upfront about limiting factors**
  - Cost, distance, location, major
- Pay for college and **complete any necessary Financial Aid applications**
  - FAFSA and CSS Profile
  - [www.finaid.org](http://www.finaid.org) (for estimate)
- **Help student keep track of deadlines**



## Parent Role

- Choose your words carefully - ~~we~~ or ~~bad college~~
- Be a member of your student's support system
  - Know when to step in/when to encourage independence
- Educate yourself about the process
  - Myths v. Facts
  - Don't believe everything you read
- **Know when to change the topic**
- **Model good behavior and etiquette**
- Think about unintended consequences

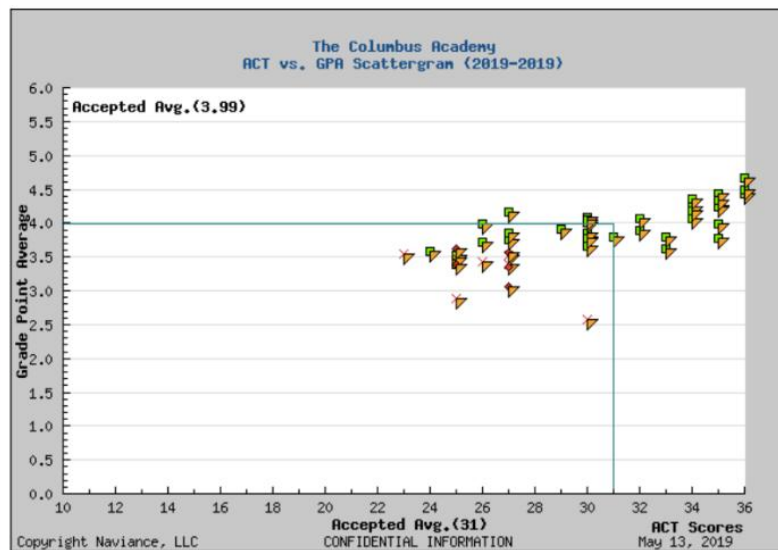

- SAT average: 1421
- ACT average: 31

### Where we see clear patterns:

- Below a 29/30 ACT without honors courses and a 3.8 GPA = regional campus placement
  - Yes, there are exceptions to this rule, but very few
- Ohio State is looking for students who have challenged themselves in high school and can demonstrate their ability on national level exams (SAT, ACT, and AP exams)

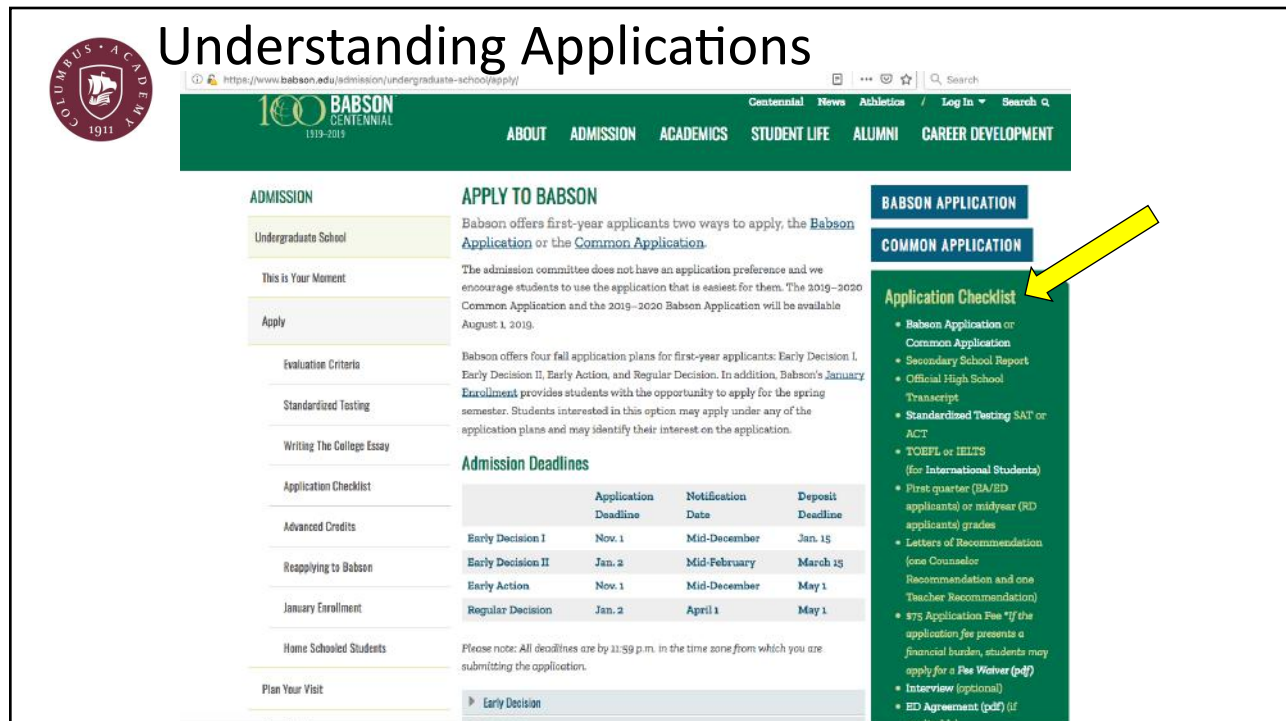


- OSU receives 53,000 applications
- OSU admits approx. 23,000 freshmen
- OSU's admit rate = 44%
- 14% of freshmen are in Honors College

1/3 of all OSU graduates began at Newark, Marion, Wooster, Mansfield, or the Lima campus

- 65% of all OSU applications are Early Action (Nov. 1 deadline)
- If applying for Honors & Scholars, Nov. 1 is THE deadline
- If applying to Engineering, Nov. 1 is "strongly encouraged"
- All parts of the application must be RECEIVED by Nov. 1, including official test scores
- August 24 SAT and Sept 14 ACT are the last test date that will meet Nov. 1 deadline for OSU

**APPLY TO BABSON**

Babson offers first-year applicants two ways to apply, the **Babson Application** or the **Common Application**.

The admission committee does not have an application preference and we encourage students to use the application that is easiest for them. The 2019-2020 Common Application and the 2019-2020 Babson Application will be available August 1, 2019.

Babson offers four fall application plans for first-year applicants: Early Decision I, Early Decision II, Early Action, and Regular Decision. In addition, Babson's **January Enrollment** provides students with the opportunity to apply for the spring semester. Students interested in this option may apply under any of the application plans and may identify their interest on the application.

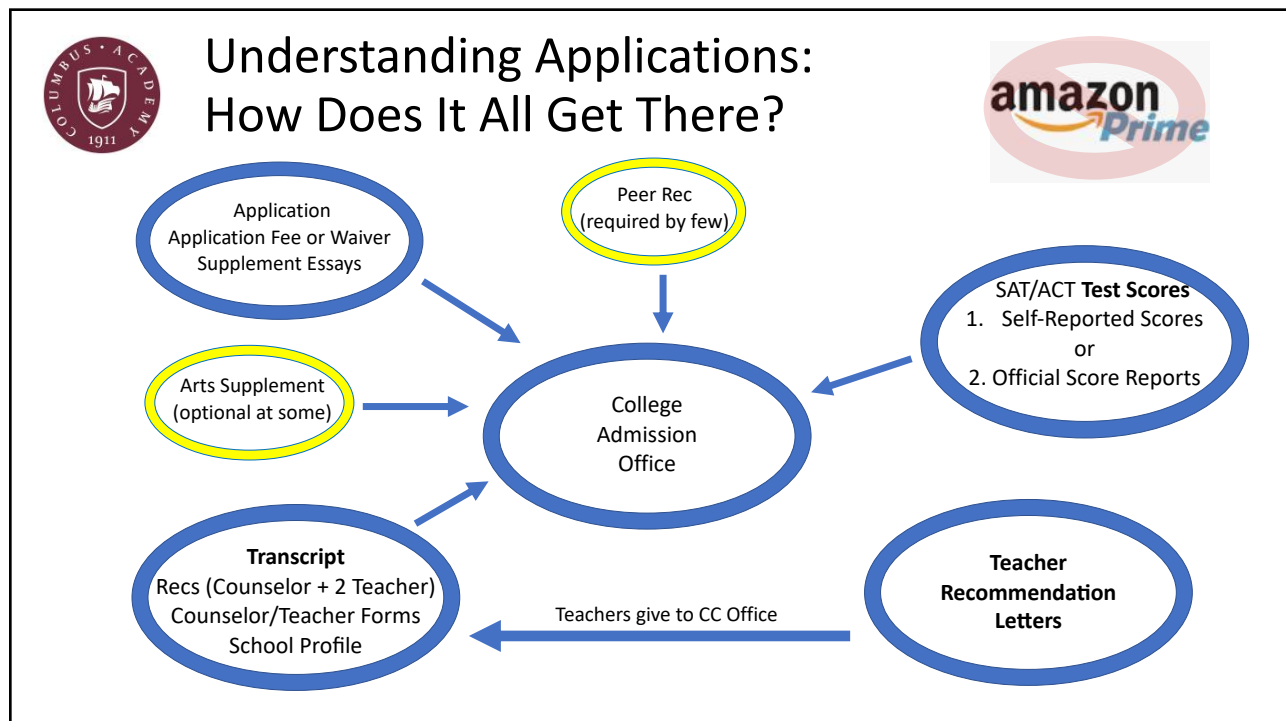

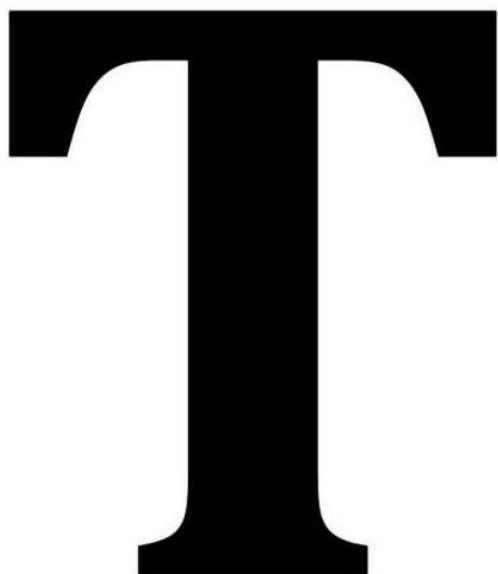

## Sending Test Scores vs Self-Reported Scores: 3 Examples from “application requirements” pages

### Colorado College

Colorado College adopted a flexible testing policy in 2011. We require that applicants submit either the SAT Reasoning Test or ACT test, or elect a third option including three exams of the applicant's choice chosen from a list of acceptable exams. [Review a list of those options here.](#)

We do not use an arbitrary cutoff point, and scores are never the ultimate deciding factor in our process. They do, however, continue to be valued as the only standardized measure among our evaluation criteria. We accept unofficial test scores in the application process. Students should list applicable scores in the testing section of the application. Students who are admitted with unofficial scores must provide official scores before enrolling.

We must receive your official ACT or SAT score sent directly from the testing agency. Scores from transcripts will not be considered. Read more about score requirements in STEP 1.

### That School Up North

\*\*\*Your SAT/ACT test scores must be sent directly from the testing agency and received in our office by our deadline. Rush paper scores are not accepted. Scores from tests taken in October will not arrive in time to complete the application for Early Action. If you have not yet had your scores reported, you can have them sent to us using these links:

### Net Price Calculator

#### Estimate Your Financial Aid

#### CWRU Net Price Calculator

The Net Price Calculator provides an early approximation of what a new first-year, undergraduate student can expect to pay to attend CWRU. It is **not intended** for use by graduate, transfer, readmitted, continuing, international or part-time students, who should instead contact the **Financial Aid Office** for more information.

This calculator is not an official application for financial aid and is not a substitute for applying for financial aid. The student must complete the **Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)** to determine eligibility for federal student aid funds; the **CSS Profile Application** must be completed to determine eligibility for institutional funds.

The results provided here are **only an estimate** and do not guarantee the actual financial aid you will receive. The estimated award is subject to the accuracy of the information you provide, may change if financial or other family characteristics change, and does not incorporate any special circumstances, which are reviewed after you officially apply for aid. If the student's parents are divorced or separated, learn **how this may affect your financial aid process**.

The data produced by the Calculator is by definition an **ESTIMATE**, and may include various forms of need-based and non-need-based financial aid and scholarship, including but not limited to grants, merit scholarships, loans, and work-study allotments. *Merit-based awards are estimates and are subject to official review of credentials.*

## Types of Applications

- Early Decision
- Early Action
- Restrictive Early Action
- Rolling Admission
- Regular Decision
- Priority, Presidential, Leadership, V.I.P.
  - These are commonly referred to as "fast apps" or "snap apps"
  - We discourage these because it is harder to track "materials sent"
  - Fee Waiver can be transferred over to use on the Common Application





## Early Decision (ED)

- Deadline - November 1<sup>st</sup> or 15<sup>th</sup>
- Early Reply - usually by December 20<sup>th</sup>
- Binding Agreement
  - If admitted, student must withdraw all other applications
  - If admitted, student must make an enrollment deposit
- Great plan if student is 100% sure it is his/her first choice
- Same formula used to compute your financial aid package, but you forfeit the ability to *compare* financial aid offers from other schools
- Your financial aid package will be an estimate
- Student will be accepted, deferred, or denied
  - Deferred students are evaluated again in the spring with other applicants
- Some schools offer an **ED II** option with a later deadline



## Early Action

### Early Action (EA)

- Application Deadlines are typically Oct 15 or Nov 1
- Notification from College – usually by January 30<sup>th</sup>
- No commitment from student required until May 1<sup>st</sup>
- Student may continue to apply to other colleges
- State universities that have EA admit the bulk of students during this time
- As with ED, applicant may be accepted, deferred, or denied

Ex: The Ohio State University and Georgetown have EA, *not* ED

Ex: University of Chicago, Villanova University, Union College, and The College of Wooster have both ED *and* EA

### Restrictive Early Action (REA)

- Same as above except:
  - Student may *not* apply early (ED or EA) to any other colleges, with few exceptions
- Examples: Stanford, Yale, Harvard





## Two Traditional Application Plans

### Rolling Admission

- Student usually receives a reply within 6-8 weeks
- Colleges using this plan will continue to admit qualified students until they have filled their freshman class.
- Apply in September/October, not December!  
Examples: University of Pittsburgh, Ohio University, University of AZ
- Qualified, but late applicants will be wait-listed or admitted to branch campuses when all slots for freshmen admissions have been filled

### Regular Decision

- Set deadline is established – usually January 1 or February 1
- All applications reviewed relative to one another after the deadline

- Colleges Visiting Columbus Academy
  - ★ Naviance Family Connection
  - TV screens in school
  - Daily e-mail to students with lunch menu/sporting events
  - Bulletin board outside of the College Counseling office
- Continued Visits to College Campuses (FALL BREAK & CONFERENCE DAY)
- Most Applications completed by November 1
- PSAT Day – Oct. 16 – last day for students to turn in essays for feedback
  - This gives counselors one week to get them back to students and time to submit all of the documents needed for Nov. 1
- Class Meetings for College Counseling (students)
- ★ Financial Aid Night – Oct. 2 at CSG (parents) ←

### October 1

Send official SAT/ACT scores to colleges with a Nov. 1 deadline

### October 2

Financial Aid Night at Columbus School for Girls, 7:00 p.m.

### October 16

Your senior should be finishing up all writing required for November 1 deadlines and getting ready to press the "submit" button

### November 1

Some College Applications are due (students)

\*\*Financial Aid Forms for ED/REA applications (parents)

### January 1

Financial Aid Forms for RD applications (parents)

***ED/EA applications have earlier deadlines. Check college websites. This is the parents' responsibility.***
